

Council News!!!

Autumn is upon us!!! I hope everyone had a joyful summer. As you already know, Route 611 is still closed. It doesn't appear to be opening back up anytime soon. Apparently, the holdup is related to work permits between Penn Dot and the Park Service. Our state and federal representatives are aware and working to try to expedite the roadway opening. Not to sound like a broken record but the road closure has hit our borough businesses the hardest, so please do whatever you can to support them. Most of the businesses have gift cards and they make wonderful birthday and holiday presents. Every few months I purchase borough business gift cards and send them out to the members of our Borough Birthday Club. They are very well received. I am happy to help support our local businesses while spreading birthday cheer in our beloved borough.

If you didn't already know, our Chief of Police, Michael Ceccato, has retired. Chief Ceccato was a great asset to our borough – the gold standard in policing. He worked hard to keep us safe, modernize our department and implement programs to afford our residents peace of mind. He was reasonable, intelligent and had a pragmatic approach to law enforcement. One of his first official acts as Chief was to issue a General Order (#22-001) to all his officers informing them that they were no longer allowed to "work from home" as they were previously allowed to by his predecessor and our Mayor. Chief Ceccato understood that using your tax dollars to pay police officers to "work from home" was not in the best interest of our borough. In his time with our department Chief Ceccato also modernized the department by increasing the use of computer systems and using social media as a means to keep our residents informed. He implemented programs like the vacation "house check". He also worked diligently with our police attorney to update the department's standard operating procedures, making sure they were up to date, relevant and included the most recent legal state policing standards. Chief Ceccato will be sorely missed. We wish him and his family well and the best in all his future endeavors. To replace Chief Ceccato, council has voted unanimously to promote Officer James Fisher to Chief. Officer Fisher was a very effective police officer in our department and has over thirty years of law enforcement experience. He was highly recommended by Chief Ceccato. Council has the utmost faith and confidence in Chief Fisher. We know he will keep up the good work he did as an officer and will continue to work hard to keep us safe. God Speed Chief Fisher.

Regarding other Council News, your council is working hard as usual. We just passed a user-friendly, comprehensive new Zoning Ordinance. This updates our prior zoning ordinance, which was passed in 1988, approximately 35 years ago. A lot has changed in 35 years and those changes, and some anticipated changes, are reflected in the new ordinance. Councilman Derek Anspach along with the borough and county planning commissions diligently worked on the new ordinance to make sure it was fair, comprehensive, inclusive, and protected our borough and its residence. It was truly a labor of dedication and love for our borough and for that we are grateful. Thank you Councilman Anspach.

In other Council News, council has approved a major paving and road resealing project involving most of our borough roads. Please bear with us in the coming months as there may be temporary road closures and diversions while the paving and sealing crews work. Our goal is to provide our residents with the best roadways we can. This project will go a long way in helping us reach that goal. Thank you to our Borough Roads Committee - Councilman Zack Booth, Councilman Jack Shoemaker and our former Borough Superintendent Harry Darlington, for all your effort and work in maintaining our roads.

Lastly, regarding Council News, council has passed a resolution supporting the use of radar detection in municipalities to assist in the enforcement of speeding laws. Pennsylvania is the only state that currently does not allow its municipal officers to use radar as a tool to enforce speeding laws. I have spoken to both our State Senator Rosemary Brown, and our State Representative Tarah Probst, and they both support legislation that would give our municipal officers this enforcement tool. There is currently legislation pending in both houses regarding this issue. Hopefully our resolution in support is helpful in getting the legislation passed.

Trick or Treating will be held on October 31st from 6pm-8pm



A Former Resident Reminisces

From time-to-time former residents of Delaware Water Gap return to explore their old stomping grounds. Recently Mr. Jim Howard was in town, stopping for a short visit on his way from Florida to Massachusetts. I had the opportunity to talk to him about life in the borough when he was a child. Mr. Howard was born in 1937 and lived in the Gap until just before his junior year of high school, when his family moved to Dreher Avenue in Stroudsburg.

One of the things we talked about was Jim's time as a student at the Water Gap School (today's Dutot Museum);

We kids were responsible for putting the flag up and down every day and we also were the crossing patrol. We'd stand down there on 611 and let the kids cross the street that needed to come across the street to go to school. And we little kids were the patrol. Every once in a while, Fred Decker, who was the chief of police at the time, would come by and talk to us and say hello. We had white chest bands with badges on them (laughs). No flags. Of course, traffic wasn't heavy at the time (laughs).

There were eight grades in the school when Mr. Howard attended it:

The upper, larger room facing away from the street [Dutot's museum room] was Miss Barber's room. She had three grades [first, second, and third]. And the other, smaller room was my mother's, Florence Koehler Howard's. And she had two grades, fourth and fifth. And downstairs, halfway down was a water fountain on the landing. And the lower room [first floor] was one room. It may have had two doors because I'm thinking the restrooms were down there too, the boys' and girls' were separated across the hall. And it was one room. Classes were held in the front of the room on benches. And the blackboard and the maps were up there in the front. And while classes were being held for one grade, the other two grades were sitting at their desks in the rear. That's the way it worked. We also had summer Bible School in that school. Some ladies would come in for a week and we'd have Bible School. Vacation Bible School, that's what it was called.

Mr. Howard told me that his family lived on Rt. 611. The family's old wooden house no longer stands, but it was across the road from the stop sign on 611 going toward Stroudsburg (across from the storage facility that sits in front of the cemetery). The house was later occupied by the Gallagher family. When Mr. Howard's family left Water Gap, they sold the land to the Standard Oil Company which built an ESSO gasoline station on the site. That, too, is long gone.

As we compared notes on living in the Gap I mentioned to Mr. Howard that as a fourteen-year-old I had worked on the garbage truck in town. He told me that he remembered the man who collected the borough's garbage when he was a kid. He was a black man.

The only black family that I knew was Beverly Robinson, his wife, and two kids. He had two horses and he would plow your garden for you. And he also collected the garbage and he provided vegetables to some people. He was well-known in town. He was up on 611 before you go up Fox Town Hill. He had a little farm on the left. We kids, if he was out plowing the garden, we would go out there and hang out with him. Beverly liked the kids. He had two horses, Charlie and Joe, and you could hear him outside [imitating Mr. Robinson's voice] "Hey Joe, hey Joe, get up in there." [laughs] He was a friend.

Our thanks go out to Mr. Howard for providing some insights into what life was like in the Gap eighty years ago.
