Ordinance No. 271

Prohibited Burning in the Borough

Local History Spot By Marty Wilson

During the 1993 bicentennial celebration of the founding of Delaware Water Gap, borough resident Bob Lehr wrote a poem to be placed in a time capsule buried at the Dutot Museum. Bob, a native of Delaware Water Gap, served his country as a US Marine, earned an M.A. in English, and taught at both the high school and college levels. He was best known as the owner of the Deer Head Inn, which he and his wife, Faye, ran from the early 1950s until Bob's untimely death in 1996 at the age of 71. The time capsule is slated to be opened in 2093. Since many of us won't be here then to read the poem, it appears in its entirety on the following page. AN APPALACHIAN TRAIL COMMUNITY

Ode to Delaware Water Gap

by Bob Lehr

On a full, dazzling late spring day
One sees, from Resort Point Overlook,
The Chasm flooded with sheen on a
Mantle of early golden green, and
The River, the Delaware, is clen and dark
And deep as it passes slowly and
Silently through the gap, and the Mounts
Minsi and Tamany rising far above.

A sauntering, wide band of concrete, And attendant traffic, winds alongside The River toward a bridge of steel and cement, And proves an intrusion on one's view of a wild hawk swooping low and looping round the bends Of the river, once viewed by creatures alone.

Where Resort Point stands today (1993)
Once a prominent edifice, the Kittatinny Hotel,
Rose four stories high, and a few hundred
Yards above, the sprawling Water Gap House
Stood watch over the valley from the Gap to Shawnee

But that was nearly a century ago when The Riverview, the Bridgeview, the Bellview and other Hotels opened their doors to tourists arriving Twice daily by trains at the new derelict depot.

We must suffer progress, so they say.
The once grand hotels fell victim to natural and
Human disasters: fire, depression, federal fiat and greed.
The banks of the eternal river, lined with sycamore,
Now sere to transport commuting workers and to
Serve the global economy in one of our
Factories; we make chemicals to dye fabrics
Sewn together in other lands, and small parts for
Large machines in far away, exotic places.

But certain continuities lie within both Nature and People; today's concept of reality is an Illusion tomorrow. History, fortunately, does not Elude us, and Delaware Water Gap's past, Its true soul, is permanently recorded in the grass and granite

That covers, yet reflects the substance of the people At the memorial cemetery, a half mile north of the river. Looking about from that peaceful place one senses Felicity; for the restfulness there, amongst the Verdant hills, is refreshing and comforting and sensual.

No morose manifestations there, rather
Revelations of a community of considerable pride:
Pride in appearance, except for the vagaries of frost
Sending a few headstones askew and pollution
Erasing some remarks about the beloved,
The site is pristine, cared for, combed and kept;
Pride in country—the soft spring breezes
Raise the scores of flags standing at veterans' places,
Patriots of so many terrible wars over two centuries,
One survived Bull Run, Chancellorsville, the
Wilderness,

Gettysburg, Antietam, only to succumb to Death at Chambers Station, aged nineteen; Pride in preponderance of a Hun heritage, the strong Names: Hauser and Hess, Shellenberger and Schoellenberger,

Heller and Heitler, Kaiser and Kresge, Weiss and Wagner;

No closed society, however, for there also lay there Flanagans, Allens, Smiths, Zuchis and Farbers; Pride in family with generations laid side by side, Head to foot, mothers, fathers, sisters, brothers, many Markers standing for those yet to expire, for those We knew were too poor to have their presence preserved,

Most remember at Memorial Day with floral tributes. The family nexus has kept us an entity for Ten generations. Ah! A first rate place to live a life.
